RELEASE TIME: SAME AS OPEN CLASS DIVISIONS. ABSOLUTELY NO VEHICLES WILL BE ADMITTED THROUGH GATES ON SUNDAY UNTIL ROADWAYS ARE FREE OF FAIR VISITORS.

All open class rules and regulations shall apply in the FFA department unless the rule is specifically replaced or altered by a FFA rule.

FFA GENERAL RULES

1. Entries must be from projects carried on as a regular part of the high school agriculture science and technology program and must be owned or leased and managed by the students for a period of at least 60 days before the Fair. Graduates who are active FFA members by having paid their local, state and national dues may compete for three summers following graduation, provided they carried the same project while enrolled in high school.

2. Any member may be asked to prove they are an active and paid member of the FFA.
3. No exhibitor shall make more than two entries in any class.
4. Enterprises carried/shown in 4-H during the current year may not be exhibited in the FFA division by an FFA member.
5. FFA/4-H members may exhibit within the same species as long as they are different project areas (i.e. breeding vs market or different breeds.) Example if someone shows cattle they may have there market steers in 4-H and their breeding cattle in FFA, or if they show hogs their gilts in 4-H or their market hogs in FFA. You **may not** weigh in one animal of the same species in 4-H and one in FFA, they have to be different species.
6. In case there is no competition or the entries are deemed unworthy of premium offered, the premium shall be awarded at the discretion of the judges.
7. The FFA Fair Coordinator shall make all interpretations covered by the FFA rules of this Exhibitor's Handbook.
8. All protests must be made in writing and presented to the FFA Fair Coordinator by the day after the judging of the protested entry.
9. Each entrant will be responsible for fitting and caring for his own exhibits.
10. In case of ties premium money will be equally divided.
11. Judges will be selected prior to the Fair and their decisions will be definitely final.
12. No person shall be allowed in the barns after 11:00 p.m. without written permission of the open class Overall Livestock Superintendent except on entry day.
13. All vehicles must be removed to the designated parking areas by 10 a.m. each morning of the Fair. Absolutely no parking allowed in barn or show areas after 10 a.m.
14. All members staying on the fairgrounds **MUST** have an adult chaperone at least 21 years of age.
15. Participants will not use tobacco, alcohol, drugs (except those directed by doctor), fireworks or firearms or remain in the immediate area when they are being used.
16. As representatives of each individual school, participants will abide by their schools code of conduct.
17. All entries must be signed by the exhibitors Agriculture Instructor.
18. **ALL SPECIAL AWARDS WILL BE DETERMINED BY AREA JUDGE AND SUPERINTENDENT.**

LIVESTOCK HEALTH REQUIREMENTS FOR EXHIBITION

The management reserves the right to refuse entry of any animal that shows evidence of a contagious disease upon clinical examination by a qualified veterinarian.

All health requirements of Open Class Livestock Show apply to Junior Shows.

LIVESTOCK RULES

NOTICE: No automatic watering devices are to be connected to hose bibs in the livestock barn without the approval of the Overall Livestock Superintendent.

ALL livestock trailers parked on the Fair Grounds will have the name of the owner and the species on a tag placed on the jack handle or hitch of the trailer. All trailers parked on the fair grounds will incur a parking fee. Tags will be given at the Livestock Office when fee is paid for.

NOTE: Paint will be available on Saturday ONLY. No painting to be done on Sunday or Monday.

1. All stock must be delivered to the fairgrounds at Canby by 10 p.m. Monday, the day prior to the fair. **NO LIVESTOCK TO ARRIVE BEFORE 12 NOON ON SATURDAY.** All market animals must arrive before weigh in time. See auction rules. **ONCE ANIMALS ARE UNLOADED ON THE FAIRGROUNDS, THEY MAY NOT LEAVE THE FAIRGROUNDS WITHOUT EXPRESS APPROVAL OF THE FAIRGROUNDS VETERINARIAN OR THE OVERALL LIVESTOCK SUPERINTENDENT.**

2. All exhibitors must furnish the necessary feed and bedding for their animals and arrange for their care. Only fir shavings allowed. Straw allowed for fiber or milking animals only.

3. Any exhibitor who does not appear with his/her animal for the class will be omitted from judging.

4. All market lambs must have been sheared and have ¼ inch or less

- wool.
5. All cattle must be tied with a neck rope in addition to the halter.
 6. All breeding animals must be purebred or high quality grades of one breed except in crossbred classes. Animals entered as registered must be registered by their respective breed association and this must be verifiable by the registration papers at check in.
Exception: Beef Calves under 6 months of with pending papers can present a copy of the registration forms in place of the actual paper.
 7. Exhibitors will be solely responsible for the condition and behavior of their stock at all times and for the condition of their stalls and pens. **ALL Swine Pens MUST be stripped and cleaned DAILY. ALL FFA pens in the ELY barn must be cleaned every day. All tack pens and areas must be cleaned out on the last day of fair. Removal of all paper, shavings, feed, etc. is required.**
Neglect of the requirements will be the cause for forfeit of the premium money.
 8. Pens and stalls may be arranged to put each school's entries together, and a sign indicating the school placed over the animals by that school. All outside tie outs must have the name of the chapter on them. All outside tie outs must be stripped on the last day of fair prior to move out.
 9. Tie outs in the beef area must also be kept in good condition and stripped the last day of fair.
 10. Any member exhibiting an animal in Beef, Sheep, Swine, Dairy and Goats must show in one showmanship contest unless excused by the FFA Coordinator.
 11. Each exhibitor will be issued a LIVESTOCK RELEASE PERMIT by the Livestock Superintendent. Release time will begin at 8 p.m. Sunday, last day of the fair. No vehicles will be allowed into the barn area, or on any roadways leading to the barn areas prior to release time. The Fair Board urges your cooperation so that release of animals can be accomplished in an orderly manner, with the least possible delay for everyone. Premiums will be withheld from anyone in violation.
 12. All exhibits will be ready for public inspection between the hours of 8 a.m. and 11 p.m. daily. Pens must be cleaned by 8 a.m. or premiums will be withheld.
 13. The breeder of the animal is the person that owned the Dam at the time of breeding for show or prizes.
 14. In breeding classes with eight or more animals, double ribbons will be awarded, at the discretion of the judge.
 15. Entries in sheep must be registered purebred or high grade, but the judges placing will be based on characteristics of the breed under which the animals are exhibited.
 16. All rams exhibited must have registration papers and registration numbers present at the fair to receive premiums except in crossbred classes.
 17. Entries must show name and registration number of sire.
 18. All entries must be earmarked or permanently identified for the show to be eligible.
 19. Age of sheep to be determined by teeth.
 20. No boars may be shown in the Showmanship Classes.
 21. Only Mt. Hood District FFA members residing in Clackamas County may show in FFA Division of Fair.
 22. Only Dairy Doe Goats can be shown.
 23. Only Exhibitors who are in their first year of showing that species may show as a Novice.
 24. All animals are subject to inspection by the veterinarian in attendance upon admission to the grounds. No animal shall be admitted or allowed to remain on the grounds that shows evidence of any infectious or contagious disease or any unsightly disease condition such as warts, ringworm, etc. The fair reserves the right to require health inspection, diagnostic tests, treatment and/or other disease control measures or procedures which might become necessary in emergencies.
 25. Animals not passing a health inspection by the fair veterinarian must be immediately removed from the grounds.
 26. The National Show Ring Code of Ethics will be adhered to and a copy of it will be posted in and outside the livestock office.
 27. There will be a GRIEVANCE COMMITTEE established, whose purpose is to provide an opportunity for any FFA member who feels they have been wronged during the FFA show to air their grievance. The committee will be made up of a FFA District Officer, at least one FFA Advisor and District Advisor. The grievance filing procedure follows:
 - a. take the grievance to the appropriate Advisor.
 - b. if the Advisor cannot or does not respond satisfactorily, the member must submit a written complaint to the Grievance

Committee.

- c. the grievance committee will meet as soon as possible with the member, Advisor and involved parties to make a recommendation. The committee will make a recommendation to the Fair Management.

CHAPTER AWARDS

A special chapter award will be offered in each of the following: Beef, Dairy, Goats, Sheep, Swine and Landscape.

To qualify for banner, Chapter(s) must have at least three exhibitors showing any five animals or classes. There must be two chapters in competition.

GRAND CHAMPION SHOWMAN

The Champion Dairy Showman, Champion Beef Showman, Champion Goat Showman, Champion Sheep Showman, and Champion Swine Showman may compete for the Grand Champion Showman award.

Any annual winner of Grand Champion Showman Award may not compete again with the same species of livestock he/she used when winning previous Grand Champion Awards.

The first place showman in the beef, dairy, sheep, swine, and goat sections will be presented individual awards in the ring. Each participant for the FFA Grand Champion Showmanship will show their own animals, if the animal is unavailable, then the participant will need to contact the Showmanship Superintendent.

SHOWMANSHIP

The purpose of a showmanship contest is to create more interest and a better knowledge of proper fitting, training and showing of animals. Breed type and conformation will not be considered.

All training and preparation of the animals both prior to and during the fair to be done by the contestants. Any animal shown in the showmanship class must be owned by the exhibitor or the member's chapter, and must be shown in regular FFA competition. Nylon or leather type halters are recommended. Cleanliness and condition of the halter are to be considered.

Novice showmanship classes are for FFA members who have never before shown in the species Showmanship classes (4-H, FFA or Open class) prior to January 1 of current year.

The top two individuals in each class will return for species champion. **EACH EXHIBITOR MUST FIT AND SHOW HIS/HER OWN ANIMALS.**
Basis of Awards:

1. Appearance of showman (neat, clean, properly dressed).
2. Poise, promptness, calmness, alertness, and attitude of showman.
3. Skill in showing the animal, including:
 - a. Continuous attention while showing;
 - b. Controlling and keeping animals placed
 - c. Ability to stand the animal; and
 - d. Ability to move animal as requested by judge.
4. The animal
 - a. Condition (fleshing)
 - b. Cleanliness
 - c. Brushing and Fitting
 - d. Clipping
 - e. Feet and Horns
 - f. Condition of equipment

Class will be divided by Superintendent.

HERDSMANSHIP

FFA LIVESTOCK HERDSMANSHIP AWARDS

The herdsmanship award is made on chapter basis. If animal(s) or exhibitor's area is not properly cared for on a daily basis, including the period following the Awards Program, the Herdsmanship Judge, Department Superintendent and Ag Advisor have the authority to have premium money withheld.

To be considered for the herdsmanship award, the exhibitor must have his exhibitor card neatly completed and displayed.
HERDSMANSHIP WILL BE DONE BY EXHIBITORS ONLY.

Banners will be awarded to the top chapter exhibiting beef, sheep, dairy, swine or goats. At least one exhibitor with five beef or dairy animals, or seven head of goat, sheep or swine must show animals for the chapter to be eligible.

FFA LIVESTOCK HERDSMANSHIP

Factors to Consider When Scoring Herdsmanship

1. **The exhibitor** -- including
 - a. Appearance, neat, clean and properly dressed.
 - b. Cooperativeness with fellow exhibitors and those in charge.
 - c. Manner, degree and promptness in carrying out duties and responsibilities.
 - d. General attitude and conduct.
2. **Care of animals**
 - a. Animals held in pens for best effect.
 - b. Animals well cared for.
 1. animals kept clean at all times.
 2. adequate bedding used.
 3. animals fed and watered regularly.
 4. blankets used properly.
3. **Care of stalls, pens and aisles**
 - a. Exhibitor card displayed that is fully and neatly completed.
 - b. Equipment kept in show boxes.
 - c. Feed kept in feed aisle and not on top of pen.
 - d. Stalls or pens kept clean and dry -- **MUST BE STRIPPED AND REBEDDED DAILY!**
 - e. Aisles kept clean and free for spectators.
 - f. All large equipment (trimming stands, wheel barrow, etc.) and tack areas will be labeled with the exhibitor's name and chapter.
 - g. No for sale signs are to be exhibited on pens or stalls.

4. Nose tongs are required on all bulls from senior bull calves and older.
5. At the conclusion of the market show both the FFA and 4-H Champion market animals will compete to determine the Champion for the Auction.
6. If you tie out you must keep your tie outs clean and they must be stripped at the end of fair.
7. There will be no Supreme Bull Award.

EXHIBITORS MUST BE PRESENT DURING JUDGING.

The State of Oregon is applying for "Pullorum Typhoid Free Status" from the Federal Government. One of the conditions is that ALL birds entering ANY fair in the State must EITHER be from a N.P.I.P. flock OR be tested negative. This applies to ALL CLASSES OF POULTRY, whether it be 4-H, FFA or Open Classes.

A technician will be on hand to test all birds requiring testing, that have not been previously tested, AFTER THE JUDGING HAS TAKEN PLACE to eliminate any inconvenience to the owner or stress to the birds before they are judged.

No charge will be made for this service.

1. Birds must be brought to the poultry barn between 8:00 a.m. and 9:00 p.m. Monday, August 15. All birds must be in place by 9:00 p.m. POULTRY WILL REMAIN ALL SIX DAYS. **NO EXCEPTIONS.**
2. Release time is 9:00 p.m. Sunday, last day of the Fair.
3. Each FFA member may exhibit no more than 6 birds.
4. The bird shall wear a leg marker at all times.
5. All entries must bear leg band identification.
6. Member will be responsible for handling his or her poultry at show time.
7. Poultry will be fed and watered by the management during the fair, with assistance from the FFA exhibitors as a part of the Birdsmanship Contest.
8. Standard of Perfection of the APA will be used as a guide to weights and other breed qualities.
9. Birds suffering from disease or parasites on arrival will be refused entry by the superintendent. At the discretion of the superintendent, birds showing signs of disease during the fair will be released and must be taken home.
10. First year FFA exhibitors may show in novice showmanship.
11. Members may enter different birds in open and FFA classes, but not both categories for the same bird.
12. Crossbred birds are judged only on condition and cleanliness.
13. All FFA exhibitors will show in showmanship.
14. Birds used in showmanship must also be judged in the appropriate conformation classes.
