



# Clackamas County Juvenile Department Intake and Assessment Center 2014

The Clackamas County Juvenile Department manages the Juvenile Intake and Assessment Center (JIAC) which is a 24 hour a day/seven day a week receiving center for law enforcement. The purpose of JIAC is to assist law enforcement with youth who have been taken into custody. The JIAC provides a temporary holding facility for youth in custody allowing law enforcement to return to their patrol duties in a timely manner. JIAC staff conduct intake assessments, screen for community safety and arrange for appropriate release. Additional screenings for substance abuse, suicide, violence and self-injury are conducted as necessary. Youth posing a community safety concern or flight risk may be placed in juvenile detention. JIAC staff coordinate services with other agencies and develop comprehensive plans which focus on community safety as well as the immediate needs of the youth.

In 2014, a total of 696 youth were brought to JIAC by local police agencies and the Sheriff's Department. Charges ranged from runaway and curfew to burglary or car theft.

## Threat of Harm Protocol

The Threat of Harm procedure provides the opportunity to identify, assess and intervene with youth in schools who make threats of violence by use of firearms, explosive devices or deadly/dangerous weapons. By combining information and resources from multiple agencies, identification and interventions can occur, supporting community safety in Clackamas County.

**Gender:** Male: 65% Female: 35%


**Average Age:** 15.2



JIAC is a short term (up to 5 hours) holding facility. The primary functions are to accept youth who are in police custody and to develop a safe release plan.
